During the year 2022 the agency has focused on maintaining our relationships with the community. Community is one of the key cornerstones of the Agency and we believe in keeping it on the frontline of



The Jefferson Police Department is proud to offer this program to its citizens. Even when measures have been put in place to reduce officer-initiated contact with citizens we still have been able to actively patrol the jurisdiction of Jefferson.

The agency has made it and will continue to make the safety and security of the city a priority. One attempt at doing this has been to designate certain businesses and areas as locations checked often. Criminal activity is known to occur at certain locations based on opportunities and police patrol. To curve this circumstance, we have adjusted and prioritized areas to be checked regularly throughout a shift.

New and Continued

- Vacation Watch Program-Continued Efforts
- East Texas Baptist University-Criminal Justice Internship
 - Includes students from ETBU riding along to learn the functions of a rural police department and how it compares to larger policing agencies.
- Reporting of Street Light Outages
 - Added Patrol Function, this has become necessary in the efforts to light up Jefferson during the evening.
- Traffic Control Survey/Signage Implementation
- Emergency Medical Responder Training
 - Currently more than half of the agency will be receiving advanced medical training to assist individuals suffering a medical emergency until EMS can arrive.
- Project Life-Saver
 - Alzheimer's Program, that allows residence to apply and the patient be provided a medical bracelet that would allow for us to track them in the event they were to wonder off.

Vehicle Fleet Usage

Currently the Agency has six operational Police Units. The oldest unit is a 2010 Dodge Charger and the newest is a 2020 Chevrolet Tahoe. Heavy vehicle maintenance expenditures have been made on the oldest dodge chargers. Efforts will be made soon to purchase new vehicles to replace the oldest units.

Goals for 2022 to be continued *Reviewed*

- A complete review and update of the current policy and procedure manual for the Jefferson Police Department.
 - This process has been started and will become a priority for 2023.
- Start the process to have Jefferson Police Department become a best practice recognized agency through the Texas Police Chiefs Association by proving compliance with 166 best practices.
 - Contact has been made with the Texas Police Chief Association and agencies that are currently Recognized Agencies to gain a better understanding of the program. This is a program that we will be participating in the future.
- Increase training for the officers of the Department that aims to advance the individual officer's Peace Officer License. (Basic-Intermediate-Advance-Master)
 - Currently the agency has hosted training and will continue to do so this year.
- Implement a Driving While Intoxicated (DWI) task force.
 - At the close of the year the dept has taken a step back from starting the task force. But continues to be a concern for the future. As DPS efforts are increased on the Texas/Mexico border less troopers are available to assist with DWI investigations.
- Further participate in Grants (State, Federal) for the Department.
 - Now that the agency is at full-staff, the agency will be seeking grants for the future.
- Participate in hosting workshops for:
 - Business Safety Measures
 - The Department was successful in teaming with the Marion County Chamber of Commerce to provide a seminar to business/home owners in Marion County. The program was free for all to attend.
 - Church Safety Procedures
 - Currently all officers are receiving training to participate Citizens Response to Active Shooters.
 - Civilian Response to Active Shooter Course for the public free of charge
- Implementing a Citizens Police Academy.
 - The agency will be moving forward this year to host a Citizens Police Academy for residence of Jefferson. The agency has been able to provide a ride-along program for members of the public to come.
